

# Crunch sparks a major boom for stage school

**A NO-NONSENSE acting coach dubbed "the Simon Cowell of theatre" says applications to his stage school have rocketed during the recession.**

Brian Timoney, who runs the Brian Timoney Actors' Studio, based at the Courtyard Theatre, in Pitfield Street, Hoxton, says seven City bankers are turning to treading the boards as they question their career path during the credit crunch.

Mr Timoney, 38, who worked with directors Ken Loach and Danny Boyle as an actor, said: "People when they are faced with situations like this start to question how they

got where they are. They think 'is this what I really want to do with my life?'

"I've got one guy who was a merchant banker but decided he wanted to do something creative."

The self-styled "real Fame Academy" opened its doors a year ago and specialises in method acting – a technique used by Hollywood greats including Jack Nicholson and Daniel Day Lewis.

Mr Timoney said: "Seventy per cent of best actor Oscar winners have been method actors. You have to use life experiences to generate real authentic emotions."

Mr Timoney's graduates

have gone on star in the West End and blockbuster films – as well as productions in Islington's theatre scene.

He said: "The Courtyard is one of the best off-West End theatres in London. There are a lot of small theatres in Islington and you're going to see more focus on them because West End theatres are putting on musicals."

With students having to undertake a rigorous boot camp in Los Angeles before performing in front of acting agents at Soho's trendy Groucho club, Mr Timoney admits his fearsome reputation is well earned.

"There's no point in classes where they are going to get flattered," he said. "It's hard to take but it can be necessary."

The awards host was ex-Islington South and Finsbury MP Lord Chris Smith, now chairman of the Environment Agency.
